WHEN? On the week of September 18th, 2023, you will turn in your Content Notes (see attached organizer) to your ELA teacher. That week, you will also take a test on the book which will count as one test grade toward your first quarter grade.

Notes? Those are better to do while not moving. Maybe the kitchen table. Test? During your ELA class.
WHY? Reading a book has so many advantages. Here are a few:
